Dental Anatomy of Llamas Dairy cows may be found either in herds or dairy farms where dairy farmers own, manage, care for, and collect milk from them, or on commercial farms. Herd sizes vary around the world depending on landholding culture and social structure. The United States has 9 million cows in 75,000 dairy herds, with an average herd size of 120 cows. Dairy plants process the raw milk they receive from farmers so as to extend its marketable life. Two main types of processes are employed: heat treatment to ensure the safety of milk for human consumption and to lengthen its shelf-life, and dehydrating dairy products such as butter, hard cheese and milk powders so that they can be stored. Daughter of Charlie and Sharon Hatcher, veterinarian, married to Chuck Yoest, is another fifth generation Hatcher to live on the farm. Jennifer manages the family veterinary practice – Rock N Country Veterinarian Services – on the farm, and was the first second generation student to graduate from the University of Tennessee College of Veterinary Medicine following her father's footsteps.
